1 Q. In the 2018 Capital Plan, the Applicant makes reference to the company's 23 hydro-2 electric plants, three gas turbines and two diesel plants. 3 4 (a) Is the electrical power generating plant in the Mobile River watershed area 5 included in the above-referenced number? 6 7 (b) That plant had been subject to litigation pertaining to a lease granted by the 8 City of St. John's to the Applicant. Has that litigation and the arbitration 9 process in reference to the same been concluded and, if so, how? 10 11 (c) Is the ownership of that plant still an issue? 12 13 (d) How is the plant being maintained and operated and at what cost to ratepayers 14 in these circumstances? 15 16 (e) Have any legal costs associated with this litigation been charged to consumers? If 17 so, provide specifics. 18 19 (a) Yes. The reference to 23 hydro-electric plants includes the Mobile Plant and the A. 20 Morris Plant, both of which generate electricity using the waters of the Mobile River 21 watershed. 22 23 (b) The litigation and arbitration process between the City of St. John's and the Applicant related to the Mobile River watershed has not been concluded. 24 25 26 (c) Yes. Termination of the Company's rights to use the Mobile River watershed for the 27 generation of electricity, together with payment by the City to Newfoundland Power of the value of the associated assets, is a possible outcome. 28 29 30 (d) Newfoundland Power is required to operate and maintain all of its hydro-electric generation assets safely and in accordance with all applicable laws. Newfoundland 31 32 Power continues to maintain and operate its Mobile River assets accordingly, and those assets continue to provide the Company's customers with very low-cost electricity. 33 34 35 (e) Yes. Legal costs, including those associated with this matter, are operating expenses of 36 Newfoundland Power and are recovered through the rates charged to the Company's 37 customers. Information regarding specific amounts of legal expenses associated with the referenced litigation is not necessary for an understanding of the matters to be 38 39 considered by the Board in this proceeding.
