  - b) Please provide a list of Newfoundland Power GRAs with cost of service studies based on historic test years.
  - c) Under current legislation is Newfoundland Power allowed to base its cost of service study on a historic test year?
  - d) Does basing the cost of service study on a historic test year change Newfoundland Power's risk profile?

In Order No. P.U. 32 (2007), the Board stated it was satisfied that Newfoundland Power's cost of service study and methodology were appropriate to be used in establishing 2008 customer rates.

d) No. Cost of service studies are conducted on a regular basis to evaluate the reasonableness of cost recovery by class of service and as a step in the traditional process for establishing Newfoundland Power's customer rates. A consistent methodology has been followed for the last 15 years.<sup>2</sup>
