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- (Reference Schedule B, Extensions) It is stated (page 11) "Extensions to distribution lines to connect new customers are constructed upon requests from developers, contractors or individual customers."
 - a) What amount of the 2025F total expenditure of \$19,982,000 was recovered via CIAC?
 - b) Since this work is carried out at the request of new customers, do all new customers contribute at least a portion towards the cost? Please explain the protocols in this case.
- a) All contributions received from customers are recorded as reductions against Newfoundland Power's net plant investment when calculating rate base. The Company does not record customer contributions as being part of a specific capital program.² The Company can confirm that CIACs are primarily associated with the Extensions and Relocate/Replace Distribution Lines for Third Parties programs.
 - The approved 2025 Capital Budget included an estimated amount of \$2,500,000 in contributions that would be demanded of customers, and which would be calculated in the manner approved by the Board.³
- b) Capital costs associated with projects and programs proposed in Newfoundland Power's 2026 Capital Budget Application are intended to be indirectly recovered from customers through customer rates.
 - Newfoundland Power does not require a CIAC from all new customers. A CIAC is only required when the cost of providing and maintaining a line extension is not expected to be recovered through the electricity rates paid by those customers. This approach ensures that the cost of extending service to a specific customer is not borne by other Newfoundland Power ratepayers. The amount of a customer CIAC is calculated in accordance with the Company's approved Residential and General Service CIAC Policies and includes the capital costs as well as an allowance for future operating and maintenance costs.4
